### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

The La Follette School seeks to mix policy-relevant academic research with current policy and program analysis. This course provides an opportunity for students to engage with cutting edge research related to public policy and public management from scholars representing a range of disciplinary and methodological approaches. As a supplement to your coursework, the seminars offer an up-close look at how research is developed by scholars and evaluated by their peers. The sessions with practitioners also provide insights into the real-world challenges of working in the public sector. While it is natural for students to focus on presentations closely related to their policy interests, the course can also provide exposure to a broader range of policy topics and perspectives. Crafting of public policy and policy analysis in the La Follette School tradition requires a sound evidence base, including scholarly work. Properly using any work requires understanding the questions motivating the research, the methodology involved, its limitations in application, and its relationship to prior work. This course will help students develop a solid foundation for continued interaction with academic research in their work.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

There will be an informational meeting on **September 25**, **2023 at 11:00am** and another information meeting will be held during the Spring semester on **January 24**, **2024 from 11:30am-12:00pm**. Students interested in taking the course for credit in the Spring should plan to attend at least one of these sessions.

The course is scheduled for credit in the Spring; however, students are also encouraged to attend seminars in the Fall semester (all of which count toward seminar attendance and summaries in the same way Spring seminars will). Students can earn 2 course credits by attending 20 seminars & submitting 20 one-page summaries.

Students must satisfy the following requirements to earn 1 course credit:

- Attend at least 10 seminars (not including meetings of the course).
- Submit a one-page summary of each seminar attended to the appropriate professor (based on the semester of the seminar). This summary should provide a brief description of the topic and key findings, as well as your own assessment of the presentation's strengths and weaknesses. Each summary should connect the seminar's topic to a reading (already) completed in a different La Follette School class and explain the connection to that reading. Please submit all papers by email and within one week of the seminar's date.
- Attend one of the scheduled course meetings.

Students may take this class for elective credit for the purposes of counting toward their La Follette School graduation requirements no more than twice during their La Follette career (and for no more than 3 credits total).

Students may also petition to count seminars offered through other campus units or, when appropriate, hosted off campus.
